Fadó fadó (Way back in the day)


Galway people (Galwegians) depended on the fishermen and their hookers (boats) for food. The fishermen fished everyday except Sunday.... And they didn't fish on Saturday in case they got stuck out at sea.... and couldn't get back before midnight Saturday night or Sunday morning!

The fishermen were very superstitious. They believed a red haired woman or a red animal such as a fox, would bring them bad luck for the day. So, if they met either in the morning, they would not go fishing that day!


There was a crafty butcher in the Claddagh who sold much more meat any time the boats stayed in the pier. He went out many evenings and tried his best to catch a fox! When he did, he went straight to the pier and tied it to a post so the fishermen would have to pass it on their way down to their boats! And, no fisherman would sail out to sea after seeing a fox! 
